

Camp Choson Connect FAQ

In this document, you can find answers to common questions about the upcoming Camp Choson Connect 2020. If you have any additional questions please reach out to eva.weigman@gmail.com

Q: If this is the first year my child is attending Camp Choson, can they still participate in Camp Choson Connect?

A: We would love for your child's first experience at Camp Choson to be in-person, but we are open to new families joining us for virtual camp. Many if not all of those who register will be returning campers, so we would want to make sure your child would feel comfortable even if they may not know any other campers. We want to make sure this is the best experience it can possibly be!

Q: What if my child will only be able to make it to one or two of the sessions and not all three? Are they still able to register and participate?

A: Absolutely! We would love for your camper to join us even if it is just for one session. We'd ask that you please let Eva Weigman (eva.weigman@gmail.com) know if this situation will apply to your camper ahead of time.

Q: Will the sessions be recorded for those unable to attend?

A: No, we will not be recording these sessions for distribution after. We feel it will provide the best experience for a camper to enjoy virtual Choson at the moment, as they may miss out on the value of discussion and sharing if watched through a recording. We also want to make sure we are protecting the privacy of our campers by not sharing recordings of the sessions. We do plan to continue posting videos to our [Camp Choson Youtube page](#) where you can stay engaged with pre-recorded content throughout the summer!

Q: Will you provide details ahead of the sessions with instructions on setting up Zoom?

A: Yes! Before the first Choson Connect session, we will reach out with instructions on how to access the Zoom session and how to best set your child up for success.

Q: Can I take pictures or screenshots of my child in their sessions?

A: No matter how awesome virtual camp is or how great the campers may be doing, we ask that you please refrain from taking pictures, recordings or screen captures of campers in their sessions. Camp does not have permission from all families to publicly share photos or videos of their kids. Please help us respect their wishes by refraining from taking pictures and or videos from our virtual sessions.

Q: If I have multiple children attending one session, can they call in on the same device, or do they need to use individual devices?

A: Each camper will need to use their own device to enter the sessions. This will not only allow them to individually engage in any virtual game or activity, but it will also allow them to be separated into different break-out rooms during the sessions.

Q: If I have multiple children attending, can they sit in on each other's sessions?

A: As a family, we are leaving this decision up to you for day camp sessions. If your child is a resident camper those sessions are only for the res camper themselves. However, we recommend that each camper is able to experience virtual camp with their peers on their own as it will provide the most authentic camp-like experience.

Q: As a day camp parent, am I expected to sit in on the camper sessions? How much space would you recommend I give my camper to allow them the best experience?

A: As the parent, we are leaving it up to you. Our younger campers (grades 1-2) may need some assistance and technical support during their session, especially if they haven't experienced distance learning yet. However, we recommend that as your child feels comfortable navigating and operating the technology that it may be best to leave them to experience virtual camp on their own. This will provide them an experience most similar to what they'd get at an in-person Choson. We will have previous instructors and assistants from 2019 in the sessions to oversee and guide the campers as needed also.

Q: What about for resident campers? How much space do you recommend I give my camper to allow them the best experience?

A: A significant part of resident camp is the opportunity to connect with others who may share a similar background or history as you, and to learn from others who may have different experiences than your own. While it is up to your discretion as a parent, we highly recommend that you allow your resident camper to experience camp on their own. This will allow them to have the most authentic virtual camp experience possible.

Q: Does my child need to bring anything to the sessions?

A: Look for an email each week from your child's Zoom instructor with instructions of any items your child may need during the session. We're hoping to learn a little bit more about each other by potentially sharing things in our homes (show & tell) or by simulating camp game experiences that may require a few basic household items.
